## Saturday Workshops 10:30-11:45(A), 1:30-2:245(B), 3:15-4:30(C)

RE, 1A: Unity Summer: Growing Social Consciousness in Teens. Jan Devor, DRE, First Unitarian Society, Minneapolis and Deb Rogers, Social Justice Coordinator, First Universalist Minneapolis. Unity Summer puts teens into social justice programs for six week paid internships. The success formula includes meetings to allow youth to process their experiences, a final project, and a celebration dinner that caps off the event.

**RE**, **1B**: Session *I* – RE Curriculum Resources and Planning. PSD Committee on Religious Education (CORE), Lori Allen, Chair. Join professional DREs from across the District as they share information, opinions, and insights on UU curricula and resources. Educators will offer programming suggestions for children and youth that you can take back home. Plan to attend Session II, as well, to create an action plan for your home congregation.

**RE, 1C:** Session II – RE Planning for Multi-Age Programs. PSD Committee on Religious Education (CORE). Work with seasoned DREs to create an action plan for your congregation's multi-age program. This is a great place for part-time religious educators to start planning for the 2004/2005 program year. Session I is a recommended prerequisite for this workshop.

Diverse, 4A: How Math Can Help Us Become More Altruistic, Cooperative, Caring Individuals. Rev. Dr. Sarah Voss, First Unitarian of Sioux City, IA. This workshop considers innovative strategies for better living – at home, at church, and even in the voting booth. Exercises come from research done for a book-in-process on "moral math." Voss is author of a book, What Number Is God?

Financial, 2B: Banking on the Future – Endowment Funds. Gordon Strayer. Mike Smith, PSD Chairman, Endowment Team and Sondra Smalley, PSD Fund Development Coordinator. Almost everything you've ever wanted to know about how to help your congregation strengthen their financial foundation. We will focus on: setting up endowments, managing funds; informing members about the benefits to their congregation of making bequests and planned giving.

Outreach 3B: Building Community through Interfaith Understanding. Rev. Vern Barnet and Rev. Kathy Riegelman, Community Ministers, Kansas City, MO. All communities, especially after September 11, 2001, need to embrace their diversity to create a safe environment. Learn about an approach to community building that uses interfaith resources.

Diverse, 4B: Creating a Policies and Procedures Manual for Small Congregations. Tamara Prenosil, UU Fellowship, Dubuque, IA. It is an amazing exercise to codify everyday actions, expectations, and institutional memory. The process can elicit both deep sharing and wisdom from task volunteers. The product can help orient new members, realign long-time members, and acknowledge the ever-changing nature of a congregation. We will share our journey and our manual. Please share yours.

Financial, 2C: A New Canvass Model – Less Work, More Fun. Gail Bishop and Linda Horton, First UU Church of Rochester MN. A successful new model for canvassing combines personal contact with fewer visits. A canvass guidebook becomes a great recruiting tool for the next year.

Diverse, 4 C: Results and the UUA – Can Your Congregation Create the Political Will to End Hunger? Amelia Rose, UUA Washington Office. 1 out of 6 U.S. children lives in poverty. More than 14 million children are orphaned due to HIV/AIDS. There is something you can do about it!

Learn to recognize it as an integral part of church life. This interactive workshop includes ways to understand what's going on with conflict and what to do about it.

Growth 5B: Strengthening Our Ties – Growing a Multigenerational Community of Faith. Rev. Phillip Lund, PSD Lifespan Program Director. Explore ways to increase the health and vitality of your congregation by fostering an intergenerational and family-oriented ministry.

Membership, 6A: Is There a Friendly Face in the Crowd? Laura Schlatter, Membership Coordinator at Unity Church – Unitarian, St. Paul, MN. Churches grow when newcomers become active, connected members. What strategies engage newcomers in ways that honor individual journeys? We'll talk about surveys, convenant groups, newcomers' classes, and more.

Membership, 6B: Moving from Regular Visitor to Committed Member. Rev. Dillman Baker Sorrells and Beth Atkinson, First UU Church, Rochester, MN. Come learn some practical tips about how to create a committed church member out of a regular visitor. Membership, 6C: Close Encounters of the UU Kind. Rev. Kathy Riegelman and Jean McCormick, All Souls UU Church, Kansas City, MO. Religious Odysseys, a Sunday morning staple every summer since 1996, allows us to strengthen our church community by sharing our theological journeys. Join us as we tell about and explore the potential of this program.

Media, 7A: Report on the Media Campaign in Kansas City. Rev. Dr. Tracey Robinson-Harris, Director of the UUA Department of Congregational Services. Youth 8A: Standing with the People of El Salvador. Beth Chronister, President and Co-founder of new UU Campus Group, University of Kansas, Lawrence, KS; and Russell Burton, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, Washburn University, Topeka, KS. Topeka's Trinity Presbyterian Church adopted a village in El Salvador 12 years ago; two years ago, the UU Fellowship of Topeka became an interfaith partner in the project. Come learn how an interfaith project can work to benefit all involved.

Youth, 8B: Youth Adult Fishbowl. PSD Youth Adult Committee. Be part of a guided process to enhance communication on issues vital to young people. Each group listens in as the other group answers pre-determined questions put forth by the non-speaking group. One group speaks while the other listens. This powerful exercise is an annual conference favorite.

Youth, 8C: Youth Cultural Exchange: Growing Commitment and Understanding Through Friendship. Barbara
Benner, Caitlin Lenox, and Hannah
Owens-Pike, First Universalist Church of Minneapolis and Eugenio Lopez,
Cuenca, Ecuador. This family program involves youth exchanges between two different cultures. Families in each country plan the program. Five exchanges have occurred over the last decade.
