

Religion is taught, or caught, mostly in the family. How can our faith tradition go more deeply into our homes? How do we create a gravitational pull around Unitarian



Universalism so that more of our children feel drawn back when they grow up and form their own families? The answer won't come in the form of traditional programming. We need a fresh approach.

His writings include Take Back Your Marriage: Sticking Together in a World that Pulls Us Apart and Take Back Your Kids: Confident Parenting in Turbulent Times. Generations of women and people of color fought too long and hard to earn the right to vote; it is our duty to protect it. UUs must be leaders on this critical issue.

B9 - Developing and Integrating a Parish Nursing Program
