The Toll War Takes on All Who Are Called to Serve

Thomas Weiner is a Unitarian Universalist in MA who has just completed a powerful book called *Called to Serve: Stories of the Men and Women Confronted by the Vietnam War Draft*.

It is a collection of dozens of first person accounts from men who served in Vietnam, men who resisted or left the country, and conscientious objectors, as well as several women who supported men in these various choices.
